### Picture Books

Ali, A.E. *Our Favorite Day of the Year*. A group of boys who approach a first day of school with trepidation become best friends throughout a school year marked by diverse holidays, the differences that make their bond special and the universal traits that they share in common.

Berger, Samantha. *What if...* A child who likes to draw and write stories imagines what would happen if there were no pencils, paper, or other tools for being creative.

Bobowicz, Pamela. *What Makes a Hero*. Meet the inimitable, expectation-destroying, glass ceiling-shattering, world-saving female superheroes of the Marvel Cinematic Universe, and celebrate the strength, intelligence, and ingenuity of the women who are vital to the stories.

Bryon, Nathan. *Rocket Says Look Up!* (series). Aspiring astronaut Rocket draws her community together to see a rare appearance of the Phoenix Meteor Showers, hoping especially that her big brother, Jamal, will look up from his phone.

Cole, Henry. *Nesting*. The story of a robin's journey as it builds a nest in a tree, lays beautiful blue eggs, raises its young and protects them from natural dangers until they can fly on their own.

English, Karen. *Red Shoes*. Malika is delighted when Nana surprises her with a beautiful new pair of red shoes! And with a click-clack-click and a swish, swish, swish, Malika wears her wonderful new shoes everywhere she goes. But one day, the shoes begin to pinch Malika's toes.

Soon Malika and Nana are off to the resale shop, where the shoes can be resold so somebody else can enjoy them! Who will be the next to wear them?

Farrell, Alison. *The Hike*. Snacks, supplies, and a dog. What more do you need for an epic adventure? In this plucky, sweet story, three intrepid young female explorers set out to conquer their local forest. Lyrical and joyous, magical and triumphant, this adventure captures the highs and lows of a hike with friends—detours, discoveries, beauty and all.

Fritsch, Kelly. *We Move Together*. A bold and colorful exploration of all the ways that people navigate through the spaces around them and a celebration of the relationships we build along the way. Follow a mixed-ability group of kids as they creatively negotiate everyday barriers and find joy and connection in disability culture and community. Perfect to facilitate conversations about disability, accessibility, social justice and community building.

Harren, Kayla. *Mary Had a Little Lizard*. A modern take on "Mary Had a Little Lamb" featuring hilarious antics as Lizard sneaks into Mary's backpack and causes nothing but mayhem in her Kindergarten class.

Higgins, Ryan T. *We Don't Eat Our Classmates*. When the class pet bites the finger of Penelope, a Tyrannosaurus Rex, she finally understands why she should not eat her classmates, no matter how tasty they are.

Higuera, Donna Barba. *El Cucuy is Scared, Too!* Ramón is a little boy who can't sleep. He is nervous for his first day at a new school. And El Cucuy is the monster who lives in Ramón's cactus pot. He can't sleep, either. It turns out that El Cucuy is scared, too!

Howley, Jonty. *Big Boys Cry*. As they walk to his new school, a frightened Levi and his father learn that it is okay for big boys to cry.

Hussain, Nadiya. *My Monster and Me*. A touching story about a little boy whose worry monster follows him everywhere he goes. It's there when he gets dressed, when he wants to play with his toys, and even when his friends come over to visit. How can he escape his worries?

Jayawardhana, Ray. *Child of the Universe*. A lyrical meditation on the preciousness of one child and the vastness of the universe, this book shares the immensity of a parent's love along with the message that we are all connected to the broader cosmos in important and intimate ways.

Joy, Angela. *Black Is a Rainbow Color*. From the wheels of a bicycle to the robe on Thurgood Marshall's back, Black surrounds our lives. It is a color to simply describe some of our favorite things, but it also evokes a deeper sentiment about the incredible people who helped change the world and a community that continues to grow and thrive.

Khan, Hena. *Under My Hijab*. As a young girl observes six women in her life who each wear the hijab in a unique way, she also dreams of the rich possibilities of her own future and how she will express her own style one day.

Lin, Grace. *A Big Bed for Little Snow*. When winter comes, Mommy makes a soft bed for Little Snow to sleep on, but each night he cannot resist jumping on the bed, causing tiny feathers to fly down.

Lindstrom, Carole. *We Are Water Protectors*. An urgent rallying cry to safeguard the Earth's water from harm and corruption, inspired by the many Indigenous-led movements across North America.

Loomis, Ilima. *'Ohana Means Family*. In this cumulative rhyme in the style of "The House That Jack Built," a family celebrates Hawaii and its culture while serving poi at a luau.

Martinez-Neal, Juana. *Alma and How She Got Her Name*. When Alma Sofia Esperanza José Pura Candela asks her father why she has so many names, she hears the story of her name and learns about her family.

McDaniel, Breanna J. *Hands Up!* A young girl lifts her hands up in a series of everyday moments before finally raising her hands in resistance at a protest march.

Miller, Zietlow Pat. *Be Kind*. When Tanisha spills grape juice all over her new dress, her classmate contemplates how to make her feel better and what it means to be kind.

Morales, Yuyi. *Dreamers*. An illustrated picture book autobiography in which award-winning author Yuyi Morales tells her own immigration story.

Nayberg, Yevgenia. *Anya's Secret Society*. Born in Russia, where left-handers are frowned upon, Anya learns to use her right hand, except when she draws with her imagined secret society of famous left-handed artists.

Oswald, Pete. *Hike*. In the cool and quiet early light of morning, a father and child wake up. Today they're going on a hike. Follow the duo into the mountains as they witness the magic of the wilderness, overcome challenges, and play a small role in the survival of the forest.

Percival, Tom. *Ruby Finds a Worry*. Ruby is a happy, curious, imaginative young girl who finds a Worry. It starts small and gets bigger every day. A new friend shows her that everyone has worries, and there's a great way to get rid of them too.

Perkins, Useni Eugene. *Hey Black Child*. A lyrical, empowering poem that celebrates black children and seeks to inspire all young ones to dream big!

Phi, Bao. *My Footprints*. Angry and lonely after being bullied, Thuy pretends she is different creatures, including an especially strong, wonderful being made up of her two mothers and herself.

Reynolds, Aaron. *Rescuing Mrs. Birdley*. An enthusiastic young animal "expert" who has learned everything she knows from television uses her mind, courage and knowledge of nature to rescue her teacher, who has escaped from school and gone wild at the local grocery store.

Reynolds, Peter H. *The Word Collector*. Jerome enjoys collecting and using words that he hears, reads, or sees, and then decides to share his collection.

Sima, Jessie. *Harriet Gets Carried Away*. While shopping with her two dads for supplies for her birthday party, Harriet, who is wearing a penguin costume, is carried away by a waddle of penguins and must hatch a plan in order to get herself back to the store in the city.

Singh, Ranjit. *Nimesh the Adventurer*. Nimesh is walking home from school. Except... there happens to be a shark in the corridor. And a dragon in the library! And why would crossing the road lead to the North Pole?

Thompkins-Bigelow, Jamilah. *Your Name Is a Song*. Frustrated teachers and classmates keep mispronouncing her beautiful name, a little girl tells her mother she never wants to go back to school. Her mother teaches her about the musicality of African, Asian, Black-American, Latinx, and Middle Eastern names on their walk home. Empowered by this newfound understanding, the young girl can't wait to share.

Verde, Susan. *Unstoppable Me*. This unstoppable little boy runs, jumps, and soars through his day. He takes a little time to refuel, then he's back at it—zooming and zipping around.

Zachariah, Abdul-Razak. *The Night Is Yours*. From a vantage point high in their apartment, a parent narrates as Amani plays hide-and-seek at night with her friends in the neighborhood.

### Nonfiction

Alko, Selina. *Joni: The Lyrical Life of Joni Mitchell* (B MITCHELL). A celebration of the life and times of the iconic folk artist, including her childhood on the Canadian prairie, her battle with polio and the cultural turbulence that inspired her.

Allen, Tessa. *Sometimes People March* (303.484 ALL). Sometimes people march to resist injustice, to stand in solidarity, to inspire hope. Throughout American history, one thing remains true: no matter how or why people march, they are powerful because they march together.

Barss, Patchen. *Flow, Spin, Grow: Looking for Patterns in Nature* (516.15 BAR). There are patterns throughout nature around us all the time: spiraling and spinning, the way shapes stack, and the way things crack.

Clark-Robinson, Monica. *Let the Children March* (323.119 CLA). Under the leadership of Dr. Martin Luther King, children and teenagers march against segregation in Birmingham, Alabama.

Elliott, David. *In the Past* (811 ELL). A poetic introduction to the dinosaur world illuminates a host of creatures both new and familiar, ranging from the mysterious Trilobite to the famed Tyrannosaurus Rex.

Fishman, Seth. *Power Up* (612 FIS). Did you know there is enough energy in your pinkie finger to power an entire city? And that everything you do—running, jumping, playing, and exploring—uses that same energy inside of you?

Maclear, Kyo. *It Began With a Page* (B FUJIKAWA). Gyo Fujikawa was the first illustrator to show babies of all ethnicities on the same pages together. Now it's time for Gyo's story to be told—a story of artistic talent that refused to be constrained by rules or expectations.

Martinez, Claudia Guadalupe. *Not a Bean* (595.78 MAR). The Mexican jumping bean isn't a bean at all. It's a fascinating home and food source for a special kind of caterpillar!

Rabinowicz, Alan. *A Boy and a Jaguar* (B RABINOWITCZ). Alan loves animals, but the great cat house at the Bronx Zoo makes him sad. Why are they all alone in empty cages? More than anything, he wants to be their champion, their voice—but he stutters uncontrollably except when he's talking to animals.

Walters, Eric. *From the Heart of Africa: A Book of Wisdom* (398.996 WAL). A collection of African wisdom gorgeously illustrated by artists from Ghana, South Africa, Zimbabwe, Canada, the United States and more.
