

The Pura Belpré Award, established in 1996, is presented to a Latine writer and illustrator whose work best portrays, affirms, and celebrates the Latine cultural experience in an outstanding work of literature for children and youth.

The award is named after Pura Belpré, the first Latina librarian at the New York Public Library. As a children's librarian, storyteller, and author, she enriched the lives of Puerto Rican children in the U.S.A. through her pioneering work of preserving and disseminating Puerto Rican folklore. The award is now given annually. It was given as a biennial award from 1996 through 2008. Author awards for Young Adult materials were added in 2021.
