Alarcón, Francisco X. *Iguanas in the Snow and Other Winter Poems** (811 ALA). Poems celebrating winter in California.

Brimner, Larry Dane and Maya Christina Gonzalez. *Without Separation: Prejudice, Segregation, and the Case of Roberto Alvarez* (379.263 BRI). The real-life events of the 1931 Superior Court of California school desegregation case of Roberto Alvarez v. the Board of Trustees of the Lemon Grove School District.

Delacre, Lulu. *Cool Green: Amazing, Remarkable Trees** (582.16 DEL). As he works with his young granddaughter to nurture a potted sapling, a Latino landscaper shares his love and admiration of trees. From the extraordinary rainbow gum tree to the mighty, towering redwood, each of the thirteen specimens he tells of is a miracle of the natural world—and some are strange beyond the wildest imagining.

Engle, Margarita. *Dreams from Many Rivers: A Hispanic History of the United States Told in Poems* (811 ENG). From Juana Briones and Juan Ponce de León, to eighteenth century enslaved people and modern-day sixth graders, the many and varied lives depicted in this moving narrative speak to the experiences and contributions of Latinos throughout the history of the U.S.

Ferrada, María José. *Niños: Poems for the Lost Children of Chile* (861.7 FER). This collection explores the hopes of the thirty-four children disappeared and killed during Augusto Pinochet's regime in Chile.

García Esperón, María. *The Sea-Ringed World: Sacred Stories of the Americas** (398.2 GAR). A collection of stories from nations and cultures across the American continents—the Sea-Ringed World, as the Aztecs called it—from the Andes all the way up to Alaska.

Gerster, Michelle and Gricelda. *Travesía: A Migrant Girl's Cross-Border Journey = el viaje de una joven migrante* (305.906 GER). This bilingual graphic memoir tells the story of Gricelda, a fifteen-year-old Mexican girl who crosses the border into America with her mother and younger brother in search of a better life.

Hear My Voice/*Escucha mi voz: The Testimonies of Children Detained at the Southern Border of the United States* (305.906 HEA). Every day, children in migration are detained at the US-Mexico border. They are scared, alone, and their lives are in limbo. This book shares, in Spanish and English, their unique stories.

Imery-Garcia, Ash. *Loreta Janeta Velázquez: Cuban Confederate Soldier* (973.7 IME). Harry Buford was a respected Confederate soldier who fought in four major battles during the Civil War and later became a double agent. However, Lieutenant Buford was actually Loreta Janeta Velázquez, a Cuban woman.

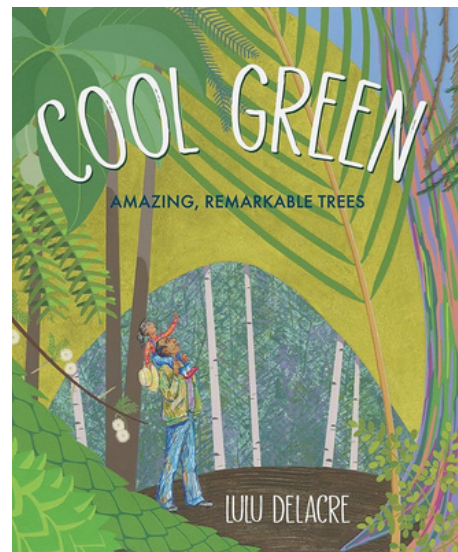
Juarez, Estela. *Until Someone Listens: A Story about Borders, Family, and One Girl's Mission** (325.73 JUA). The true story of Estela Juarez, a young American girl who writes letters to her local newspaper, to Congress, and even to the president, pleading for someone to listen and reunite her family after her mother's deportation.

Martinez, Claudia Guadalupe. *Not a Monster* (597.858 MAR). An axolotl egg hatches and matures in the Xochimilco canals in Mexico City, the only natural habitat of these unique salamanders that spend their lives in water. Also by Claudia Guadalupe Martinez: *Not a Bean* (595.78 MAR).

Menéndez, Juliet. *Latinitas: Celebrating 40 Big Dreamers** (920.72 MEN). A celebration of Latinas and Latin American women who followed their dreams, with portraits and short bios.

Mora, Pat. *My Magic Wand: Growing with the Seasons* (811 MOR). Poems that celebrate family, childhood experiences, and the pure pleasure a young girl feels as she grows and learns all year long.

Robbins, Dean and Eric Velasquez. *Mambo Mucho Mambo!: The Dance That Crossed Color Lines** (793.3 ROB). In 1940s New York City, Italians danced to jazz, Puerto Ricans danced to Latin songs, and they were forbidden to dance together... until a band and a ballroom broke the rules. Machito and His Afro-Cubans hit the scene with a brand-new sound of Latin jazz, then the Palladium Ballroom issued a bold challenge to segregation and opened to all.



Rosenstock, Barb and Erika Meza. *The Mystery of the Monarchs: How Kids, Teachers, and Butterfly Fans Helped Fred and Norah Urquhart Track the Great Monarch Migration* (595.789 ROS). An entomologist and his wife solve the mysteries of monarch butterfly migration with the help of schoolchildren in the U.S., Mexico, and Canada.

Salazar, Aida. *In the Spirit of a Dream: 13 Stories of American Immigrants of Color* (920 SAL). Many immigrants set out across continents, oceans, and borders, traveling to the U.S. in pursuit of opportunity.

Tonatiuh, Duncan. *Feathered Serpent and the Five Suns: A Mesoamerican Creation Myth* (398.2 TON). This pre-Columbian creation myth tells the story of Quetzalcoatl, one of the most important deities in ancient Mesoamerica.

Valladolid, Marcela. *Cocinado on Cook Street: A Collection of Mi Familia's Recipes* (641.597 VAL). Chef Marcela Valladolid's children's cookbook leads readers through the magic and legacy of her family recipes.

Vourvoulis, Sabrina. *Nuestra América: 30 Inspiring Latinas/Latinos Who Have Shaped the United States** (920.009 VOU). From the Smithsonian Latino Center, *Nuestra América* highlights the inspiring stories of thirty Latina/o/xs throughout history and their incredible contributions to the cultural, social, and political character of the United States.
